Our mission is to make bicycling, walking and wheeling so safe, convenient and fun that people choose clean, active modes of travel and recreation

Recommendations

- Adopt a Vision Zero approach to road safety.
- ➤ Use a "complete streets" approach to guide the development and redevelopment of Parry Sound area roads.
- Apply the 8-80 rule when making policy and infrastructure decisions that affect public spaces, including roads.
- Provide sidewalks on both sides of arterials and on at least one side of residential streets.
- ➤ In winter, maintain sidewalks and pedestrian routes to at least the same standard as roads.
- At intersections, eliminate conflict between pedestrians and motor vehicles, for example by prohibiting right turns on red lights.
- Set speed limits to 30 km/h in school zones. Design roads in ways that reduce speeds and implement more traffic calming measures.

Vision Zero

Vision Zero is a long-term traffic safety strategy that aims to achieve zero traffic fatalities and serious injuries. The Vision Zero approach to road safety can be summarized in one sentence: No loss of life is acceptable.

Complete Streets

Complete streets should be designed to be safe, convenient and comfortable for every user, regardless of transportation mode, physical ability or age.


8-80 Rule

Walking should be safe and attractive for all ages. Healthy communities provide safe, accessible and enjoyable places for everyone to walk and bike in their daily routines.

Vision Zero Principles

- No loss of life is acceptable
- Human beings are fallible
- Tolerable limits are set by the physical endurance of human beings
- Human beings have a right to a safe transport system

When struck at 30 km/h, an adult has a 95% chance of living; at 60 km/h it is only 10%.
